

Our Impact in 2019...

- 225 Littles and 100 Mentors participate in our Community, In-School Mentoring and Group (Go Girls & Game On) Programs
- We had a total of **216 volunteers** give back to our agency -- donating **15,788** hours of their time!
- We had **5 Practicum** and **4 MBA students** complete their internships and practicums at our office
- 3 youth from the Claro Life Skills Program volunteered by sorting and working in the Big Deals Boutique.
- 27 Mentors attended High 5 Training provided by BCRPA
- 11 Littles attended Tim Horton's Camp and 5 Littles participated in Camp Day at Tim Hortons (Bowen and Campbell Street locations)
- **80 people** (Littles, Mentors, parents, donors, supporters, board and staff) attended our first annual Mentor Appreciation event!
- 20 attendees participated in our Flag Raising for Big Brothers Big Sisters Day at City Hall and at our Bastion Light Up on September 18th






Testimonial - Practicum Student
